	AN ORDINANCE introduced by City Manager Norton N. Bonaparte, Jr., amending City of Topeka Code § 70-121, § 70-123 and § 70-193, concerning Fire Prevention and Protection and adopting the 2006 Life Safety Code, and specifically repealing said original sections as well as § 70-122, § 70-191, § 70-192, and § 70-195 through § 70-199.			
	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TOPEKA, KANSAS:			
	Section 1. That section 70-121, Adopted, of The Code of the City of Topeka,			
14	Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows:			
15	Adopted.			
16	(a) There is hereby adopted by reference chapters 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, <u>8</u> , 9, <u>10</u> ,			
17	11, 13, 15, 17, 19, 20, 21 (sections 21-1 and 21-2), 23 (except sections 23-2.1.2, 23-			
18	2.1.3.1, 23-2.1.3.2, 23-2.1.3.3, 23-3.1.2.1, 23-3.1.2.2, 23-3.1.3.1, 23-3.1.3.2, 23-3.1.3.3,			
19	23-4.1.4), 24, 25 <u>, 26,</u> 27, -28, 29, 30 (sections 30-1 through 30-8), 31, 32 33, <u>34, 35, 37,</u>			
20	<u>39, 40, 41, 42,</u> appendix <u>Annex</u> A and appendix <u>Annex</u> B of the Life Safety Code,			
21	19912006 edition, as published by the National Fire Protection Association, Inc.			
22	(b) Chapter 2 of the Life Safety Code, 2006 edition, is also incorporated			
23	herein and may be considered and applied by the fire chief to the extent necessary in			
24	the fire chief's sole discretion to implement and enforce the Life Safety Code.			
25	(c) Chapters 12, 14, 16, 18, 20, 22, 28, 30, 32, 36, 38, and 43 of the Life			
26	Safety Code, 2006 edition, are specifically not adopted herein.			
27	(bd) Facilities which are in service prior to the adoption of the 19912006 edition			
28	of the Life Safety Code and not in strict conformity therewith may continue in service			
29	provided such facilities are not determined by the fire chief to constitute a distinct			
30	hazard to life or property.

31	Section 2. That section 70-122, Amendments, of The Code of the City of	
32	Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:	
33	Amendments.	
34	Section 11-7.1.1.1 of the Life Safety Code, 1985 Edition, is hereby amended to	
35	read as follows:	
36	The requirements detailed in section 11-7, child day care centers (more than 12	
37	children), are based on the minimum staff-to-child ratios given below:	
38	Staff-to-child ratios for day care centers providing care for more than 12 children	
39	shall be in conformity with applicable state statutes and regulations.	
40	Section 3. That section 70-123, Appeals, of The Code of the City of Topeka,	
41	Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows:	
42	Appeals.	
43	(a) The board of building and fire appeals as defined in the Code of the City of	
44	Topeka 26-138 shall be empowered to hear and determine interpretations of the Life	
45	Safety Code and to permit exceptions, or variances or waivers from the Life Safety	
46	Code provisions in certain cases or situations, in accordance with the purposes and	
47	intent of the code. An exception, or variance or waiver shall not be granted except in	
48	those situations, as determined by the board, that will not endanger life or limb, health,	
49	property or public welfare.	
50	(b) An exception, or variance or waiver relating to the Life Safety Code may	
51	be vetoed by the fire chief. Requests for exceptions, or variances or waivers which have	
52	been denied and matters vetoed may be appealed to the council by filing within ten	
53	days of the effective date of the denial or veto, in writing, with the city clerk, a request	

for a hearing before the council. Within five days of the receipt of this request for a

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55 hearing, the council shall give notice of a public hearing to be held in no less than five 56 days nor more than ten days after service of the notice on the person requesting the 57 hearing.

(c) A judgment rendered or final decision made by the council may be reversed, vacated or modified by the district court on appeal. It shall be sufficient for an aggrieved party to file a notice that such party is appealing from such judgment or decision with the council within 30 days of its entry, and then causing true copies of all pertinent proceedings before the council to be prepared and filed with the clerk of the district court in the county in which such judgment or decision was entered.

64 <u>Section 4</u>. That section 70-191, Definitions, of The Code of the City of Topeka,
65 Kansas, is hereby repealed:

66 **Def**

Definitions.

67 The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this division, shall have 68 the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly 69 indicates a different meaning:

Evacuation capability means the capability of the group, residents and staff to
 evacuate the building or relocate from the point of occupancy to a point of safety. The
 evacuation capability shall be determined by the authority having jurisdiction. The
 following levels of evacuation capability are recognized by this division:

74 (1) Prompt: Evacuation capability equivalent to that normally accepted
 75 as the ability to relocate all of the endangered occupants to a point of safety
 76 within approximately three minutes from alarm or other alerting signal.

77 (2) Moderate: Groups that can successfully execute evacuation and
 78 relocate to a point of safety in approximately five minutes longer than that as

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defined as prompt evacuation.

80 (3) Slow: Groups that can successfully execute evacuation and
 81 relocate to a point of safety in approximately ten minutes longer than that defined
 82 as prompt evacuation.

83 (4) *Impractical:* Groups that cannot successfully execute evacuation
 84 and relocate to a point of safety within approximately ten minutes longer than that
 85 defined as prompt evacuation.

86 *Personal care* means protective care with or without watchful oversight of a 87 resident who does not have an illness or a condition which requires chronic or 88 convalescent medical or nursing care with a 24-hour responsibility for the safety of the 89 resident when in the building. Protective care with or without watchful oversight may 90 include a daily awareness by the management of the resident's functioning, his 91 whereabouts, the making and reminding a resident of appointments, supervision in 92 areas of nutrition and medication, and actual provision of transient medical care.

93 *Point of safety* means a location that meets one of the following:

- 94 (1) Is exterior and away from the building.
- 95 (2) Is within a building of any construction protected throughout by an
 96 approved automatic sprinkler system.
- 97

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(3) Is within a portion of a type I-FR or II-FR building which is separated by smoke barriers of at least a 20-minute fire resistance rating.

- 99 Residential board and care occupancy means a building or part thereof that is
- 100 used for the lodging and boarding of six or more residents not related by blood or
- 101 marriage to the owners or operators to provide personal care services, but not to
- 102 provide nursing care. The following are examples of facilities that normally classify as

103 residential board and care occupancies:

- 104 (1) A group housing arrangement for physically or mentally
 105 handicapped persons who normally work in the community, attend school, or
 106 otherwise use community facilities.
- 107 (2) A group housing arrangement for physically or mentally
 108 handicapped persons who are undergoing training in preparation for independent
 109 living, for paid employment, or for other normal community activities.
- A group housing arrangement for the elderly that provides personal
 care services but that does not provide nursing care.
- 112 (4) Facilities for social rehabilitation, such as those used for the
 113 treatment of alcoholism, mental health problems, etc., that contain a group
 114 housing arrangement, and that provide personal care services but do not provide
 115 nursing care.
- 116 (5) Other group housing arrangements that provide personal care
 117 services but not nursing care.
- 118 *Two remote routes.* To meet the requirements for two remote routes, each 119 bedroom shall have access to two routes leading to two separate building exit 120 doorways. Exit doors shall be of the side-hinge type.
- 121 <u>Section 5</u>. That section 70-192, Objective, of The Code of the City of Topeka,
 122 Kansas, is hereby repealed:
- 123 Objective.
- 124 The objective of the division is to provide a reasonable level of safety to 125 individuals within residential board and care occupancies.
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127	Section 6. That section 70-193, Certificate of compliance, of The Code of the
128	City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows:
129	Certificate of compliance.
130	A certificate of compliance issued by the city from the fire department and the
131	environmental code services property code enforcement division shall be required for all
132	small and large residential board and care occupancies.
133	Section 7. That section 70-194, Variances, of The Code of the City of Topeka,
134	Kansas, is hereby repealed:
135	Variances.
136	The board of building and fire appeals will act as the authority to consider and
137	waive any requests for variances from the terms of this division.
138	Section 8. That section 70-195, Small facilities, of The Code of the City of
139	Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:
140	Small facilities.
141	(a) This section applies to residential board and care occupancies providing
142	sleeping accommodations for six through 15 residents. Where there are sleeping
143	accommodations for 16 or more residents, the occupancy will be classed as a large
144	facility.
145	(b) The requirements of this section are applicable to new construction and
146	existing buildings.
147	(c) Small facilities shall comply with the requirements listed in table 1.
148	(d) The address of small facilities shall be visible from the street on
149	contrasting background with numbers at least six inches in height.

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Appendix A

A hazardous area is any space that contains storage having a fuel load with the potential for a fully involved fire. Examples of hazardous areas include, but are not limited to: (1) areas for cartoned storage, food or household; (2) maintenance items; or (3) storage areas of residents' belongings. If a hazardous area is on the same floor as, and is in or abuts, a primary egress route or a sleeping room, the hazardous area protection consists of: (1) an enclosure with a fire-resistive rating of at least one-hour with a self-closing or smoke-operated automatic closing fire door having a fire protection rating of at least three-fourths hour or sprinkler protection of the hazardous area and a separation that will resist the passage of smoke between the hazardous area and the exposed sleeping area or primary exit route. Any doors in such separation are selfclosing or automatic closing on smoke detection. The closing device is not required for hazardous spaces where the nature of the space is such that the door is kept closed at all times.

170 <u>Section 9</u>. That section 70-196, Large facilities, of The Code of the City of 171 Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:

172 Large facilities.

173 (a) This section applies to residential board and care occupancies providing
 174 sleeping accommodations for 16 or more residents. Large facilities shall meet the
 175 requirements of the currently adopted Uniform Building Code. For prompt and moderate
 176 evacuation capability, R-1 standards shall apply. For slow and impractical evacuation
 177 capability, I-1 standards shall apply.

- 178 (b) The requirements of this section are applicable to new construction or
 179 existing buildings.
- (c) Emergency lighting for large facilities shall be required in accordance with
 NFPA standards 70.
- 182 (d) Smoke alarm systems as per NFPA standards (72A) shall be required in
 183 large facilities.
- (e) The address of large facilities shall be visible from the street on a
 contrasting background with numbers at least six inches in height.
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187 <u>Section 10</u>. That section 70-197, Evacuation plan, of The Code of the City of
 188 Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:

189 Evacuation plan.

190 The administration of every residential board and care facility shall have in effect 191 and available to all supervisory personnel written copies of a plan for the protection of 192 all persons in the event of fire and for their evacuation to areas of refuge and from the 193 building when necessary. The plan shall include special staff actions including fire 194 protection procedures needed to ensure the safety of any resident, and shall be 195 amended or revised upon admission to the home of any resident with unusual needs. 196 All employees shall be periodically instructed and kept informed respecting their duties 197 and responsibilities under the plan. Such instruction shall be available at all times within 198 the facility. The city fire department shall approve the fire protection procedures 199 established by the facility. If the procedures are not satisfactory, in the opinion of the city 200 fire department, the city fire department will establish a fire protection procedure for the 201 facility.

202 <u>Section 11</u>. That section 70-198, Resident training, of The Code of the City of 203 Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:

204 Resident training.

All residents of residential board and care occupancies capable of assisting in their evacuation shall be trained in the proper actions to take in the event of a fire. This training shall include actions to take if the primary escape route is blocked. If the resident is given rehabilitation or habilitation training, training in fire prevention and actions to take in the event of a fire shall be a part of the rehabilitation training program. Residents shall be trained to assist each other in case of fire to the extent their physical

211	and mental abilities permit them to do this without additional personal risk.		
212	Section 12. That section 70-199, Fire exit drills, of The Code of the City of		
213	Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed:		
214	Fire exit drills.		
215	In all residential board and care occupancies, fire exit drills shall be conducted at		
216	least six times per year. The drills may be announced to the residents. The drills shall		
217	involve the actual evacuation of all residents to a selected assembly point and shall		
218	provide residents with experience in exiting through all exits required by code. Exits not		
219	used in any fire drill shall not be credited in meeting the requirements of this Code for		
220	board and care homes. A record and timing of all such drills shall be required.		
221	Section 13. That original § 70-121, § 70-123 and § 70-193 of The Code of the		
222	City of Topeka, Kansas, are hereby specifically repealed.		
223	Section 14. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its		
224	passage, approval and publication in the official City newspaper.
